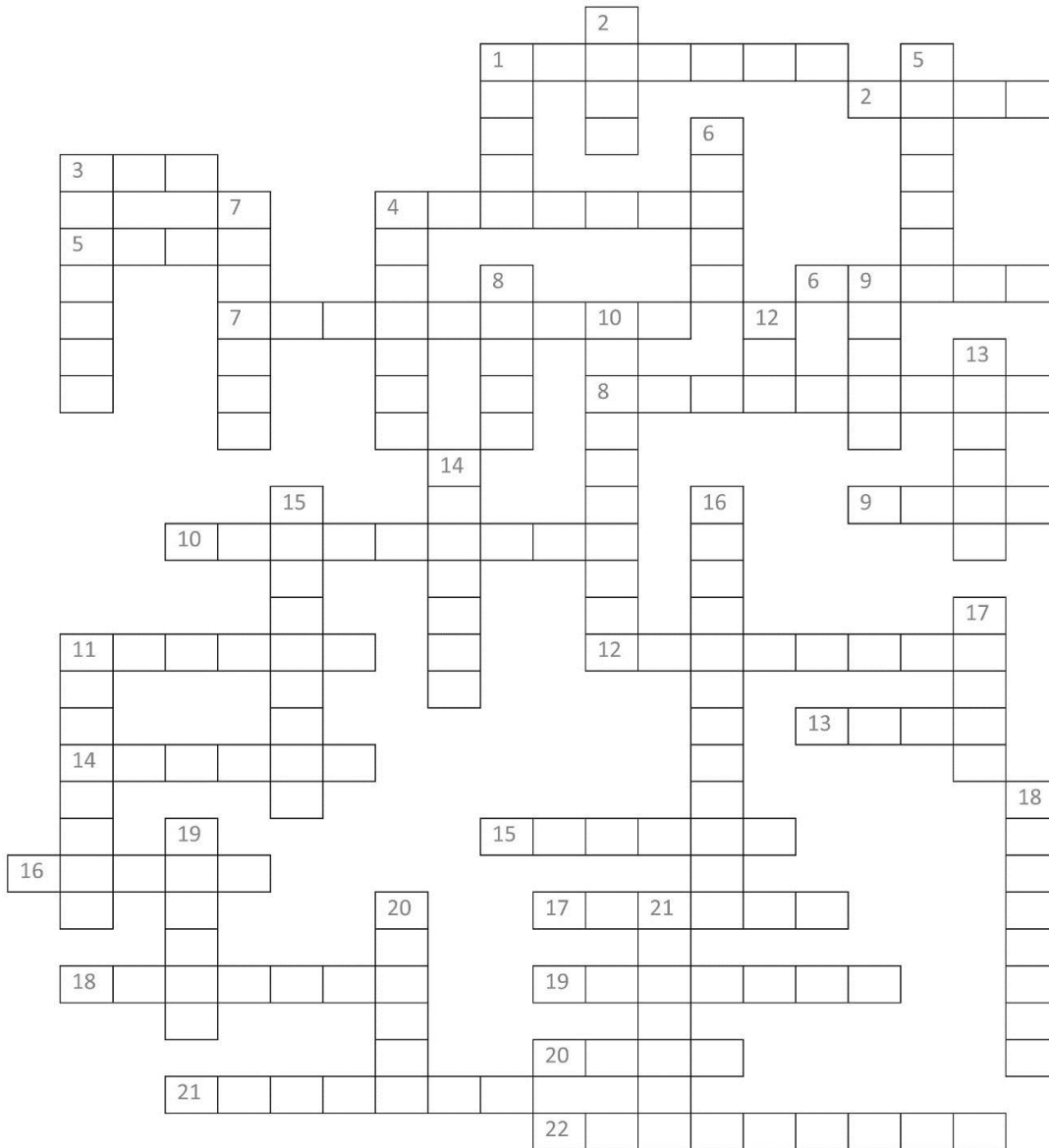


Railroad Crossword

ACROSS

1. Audible signaling device on a steam locomotive used to warn that the train is approaching and to communicate with rail workers
2. A steam-driven railway locomotive has been referred to as this type of horse.
3. An enclosed part of a locomotive where the operator sits.
4. Material being transported by the railroad cars in exchange for pay.
5. Used to make noise to alert people and animals of an oncoming train.
6. Water changed to an invisible gas by boiling and used to power a locomotive.
7. A schedule showing the times at which railroad trains arrive and depart specific train stations.
8. The person in charge of a train.
9. Used as fuel.
10. A lamp on the front of a locomotive.
11. A person hired to carry baggage at a railroad station.
12. Railroad person who operates or is in charge of the locomotive.
13. This color of lantern was displayed to protect men working in, under or around railroad cars.
14. Railroad car used to transport bulk shipments of liquids or gasses.
15. Evidence that the holder paid a fare to board a train.
16. A self-propelled, connected group of rolling railroad cars
17. This color of lantern is used on each end of a railroad car to indicate a parked occupied railroad car.
18. A stopping place for trains.
19. Partially or mostly burned pieces of coal or wood.
20. Energy source for engines
21. Joins railroad cars together to form a train.
22. A railroad car equipped with tables and chairs, in which meals are served.

DOWN

1. This color of lantern is used to pass signals from the Brakeman/Conductor to the engineer.
2. Rectangular supports for the rails in railroad tracks.
3. A car on a train used chiefly as the crew's quarters and usually attached to the rear of the train.
4. Where coal, oil or other fuel is burned to generate steam and power a locomotive.
5. A complex structure that is used especially for supporting railroad tracks over a valley or river.
6. A self-powered vehicle.
7. A railroad car with no sides or top.
8. A pair of steel bars that provide the running surfaces for the wheels of railroad cars.
9. Two parallel lines of rails with crossties, on which a railroad train runs.
10. Engine powered by steam, diesel or electricity for pulling or, sometimes, pushing railroad cars.
11. The raised area between or alongside the tracks of a railroad station, from which the cars of the train are entered.
12. This color of lantern is used to protect the rear of the train and was used at Railroad crossings before electricity.
13. Enclosed railroad car generally used to carry freight.
14. A rail line with lighter-weight equipment and roadbed than a main-line railroad.
15. A person who is traveling on the railroad.
16. Wheels specially designed for use on rail tracks, to keep the train running on the rails.
17. This color of lantern is used on Valley Railroad and some others instead of a white lantern to pass signals between the brakeman/conductor to the engineer.
18. Where a road and a railroad track meet.
19. A safety device or structure, usually with lights, beside a railway line to give information about the line ahead to train.
20. An underground railroad passage.
21. Used to send signals among railroad crews even when far away and even at night.
